Step 1: Determine Your Needs and Program Structure

Whether you have a large or small business, apprenticeship can work for you. Apprenticeship can be a single employer, an association of employers, or a jointly administered program by labor and management. No matter your business type, we will help you succeed!

Step 2: Define Occupation and Determine Essential Job Skills

Your business defines the occupation that fits your business needs. You analyze the job and detail the essential work processes for mastery of the trade.

What occupation(s) does your business need to fill? What specific "skill sets" and/ or certifications do you want these employees to have? How many hours of supervised on-the-job training is necessary to acquire proficiency/ mastery of those skills?

Step 3: Identify Educational Partners and Desired Classroom Component of Training

Every registered apprenticeship program involves both on-the-job training and related classroom instruction (RSI). Local DAS consultants have relationships with local educational providers in your area who can help you design and approve necessary curriculum and provide the requisite classroom instruction – usually at no cost to the program or individual apprentices.

Step 4: Establish Apprenticeship Program Standards

The "Apprenticeship Standards" are the basic governing and guidance document for your apprenticeship program. The Apprenticeship Standards include such things as selection procedures; wages to be paid at various levels of skill acquisition (so that apprentice wages are commensurate with the skills they possess); procedures for advancing apprentices to the next level; and ultimately, graduation requirements – including academic credit and any desired certifications.

Step 5: Submit for Approval

Through the process, the Division of Apprenticeship Standards will assign your business a consultant to help you with the development of your training program. The apprenticeship consultant helps facilitate program development, designs and organizes its components, facilitates recruitment, and provides guidance with State laws, rules, and regulations. This service is free to all interested and prospective apprenticeship program sponsors.
